

POINT VOTING PATTERNS

We have been asked several times to publish the following results of votes cast in the Point for the April 4 City Council Primary election. This breakdown of the votes may be interesting to you in view of the General Election next week.

Totals in the seven Point precinsts were: Roselius -372; Grydyk, 314; Spinner, 124; Doherty, 116; Wagerman,



Lyons, 90; Davis, 85; Bates, 63; 10 others -- 148. Total no. of voters -610.

With 610 total voters at 3 possible votes each, the maximum number of votes is 1830 compared to 1605 votes actually cast. From this difference it could be deduced that 498 persons cast 3 votes while 112 person cast only 1 vote.
