

A DRY SHIP ENTERS THE DRINK....

April 3, 1913...

"Without wine, women or song the new Standard Oil River Steamer 'Petroleum No.3" was successfully launched at the Union Iron Works in San Francisco yesterday at 9:30 a. m.

"The Steamer glided down the greased ways, fully completed, with steam up, crew aboard and ready for service in the bay.

This is the first time this has taken place on the Pacific Coast.


"Instead of wine, a member of the crew unceremoniously rubbed a bottle of soda on the forward peak, snapped off the tin cork and sprinkled it on the deck as the vessel gracefully plunged into the water at flood tide.

"The Petroleum is a modern steel stern wheel steamer for carrying refined oil. It will carry 5200 gallons and a hold of 25 tons of freight or package goods. Her cargo pumps are worked by fuel oil engines so the boiler can close down while discharging cargo, eliminating danger of fire."

NEW BOOKS:

PARTLY CLOUDY AND COOLER by Elizabeth Uhr is a genuinely funny novel set in a university town. A few of the cast of motley characters are Frank Wilkinson, an inordinately tall young man addicted to graduate study and adultery; his latest conquest, the fragile Eloise, who has a trying husband, a mother-in-law who follows Mary Baker Eddy, and a four-year-old daughter with odd predelictions; Seyfried, a flambuoyant hair-dresser, and Rocky his somewhat less flambuoyant friend. Outrageous, rowdy, funny and original.

THE DEADLY EURASIAN by Alexander Cordell goes something like this:
An enormous explosion and flash of light has caused destruction and havoc on the Chinese mainland in the region of Canton. Early reports indicate a U.S. atomic attack, or a lone American missile untleashed by a fanatic. Was it a governmental act of war, or a warped and unauthorized provocation? Enter Mei Kayling, a

young and beautiful Eurasian, a dedicated graduate of Peking's School of
Espionage. Her orders: proceed immediately to Hong Kong. Find out quickly the
reasons for the Big Light. If their government authorized it, the Americans
must pay. Promptly and in kind. Mei
Kayling's journey takes her far from
Red China, through many adventures and
supporting characters, and into one of
the most startling climaxes in spy fiction.

OVERLIVE by William M. Birenbaum is eloquent nonfiction addressing itself to the causes and to the possible solutions of the educational crisis in America. Overlive does not merely attack the root causes of the educational upheaval now in progress, it offers a plan to restore meaning to the learning process. Dramatically, it contends that we cannot disregard with impunity the depressed condition of the inhabitants of our ghettos, black and white; that any amelioration of the general sickness of our society must include a particular concern with those who have been deprived of their full American heritage.

AMERICA'S FIRST CIVILIZATION

by M. Coe presents some answers to a 400-year-old puzzle concerning the roots of the marvelous Pre-Columbian empires. Now, as a result of startling archaeological discoveries in Mexico, a full picture is emerging of a so-called 'mother culture', a new world civilization as old as ancient Troy-- the Olmec, Beautifully illustrated.
