

VIRTUOSO VARIETY SHOW A SUCCESS



Point Methodist Church History

Church history is rich with contributions of women. One church group in the 1920's was the SOCIAL LEAGUE of the first Methodist Episcopal Church whose history is reflected in their minutes printed below and taken from the canvas covered, red leather cornered notebook which cost \$1.15. The minutes are printed as written. This is the 32nd installment.

Sept 11, 1925

Social League met in the church Parlors with Mrs. Holbrook and Mrs. Elizabeth Jenkins as hostesses. Roll was called with 20 members present. Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

List of members who had paid their assessment was read and those who had not paid were requested to give the matter their attention.

Mrs. Holbrook offered to make a rag rug for the bazaar and asked the members to contribute any old cotton article for this purpose.

It was moved and seconded that Mrs. Burdick be paid \$1.00 to cover the purchase of stamped bureau scarfs for the bazaar. Carried.

Election of officers

Mrs. Dicely elected President

Mrs. Brother " 1st Vice Pres.

Mrs. Seymour " 2nd "

Mrs. Dustheimer " Sceretary

Mrs. Oehne " Treasurer

Motion was made by Mrs. Danner that the 3rd Saturday of each month be definitely decided upon as the date for our Food Sales. Motion carried. Mrs. Jones reported that all but \$30 had been made up of the \$85 shortage in church finances. She also thanked the League for their loyal support and said the church finances were in better condition than they had been for years.

My Memories of the Stairley Family

I read with interest Allen Smith's article in the November Point about the Stairley family My family lived up the hill from the Stairley and knew them fairly well so I thought I would add a little more to his article. I remembered them well when I was a child and knew most of them well in later years.

The Stairley family lived in a three story wooden residence on the south side of the lower end of Montana street. The father, Waverly Stairley I recall as an elderly man who I often saw walking down east Richmond avenue. He always dressed in a long black over coat and large black hat. Also he had a long white beard and usually had a small white dog on a leash. Mr. Stairley came to Richmond in an about 1902 and started the first bank. This Bank of Richmond was later taken over by other banks including the American Trust Co. and later became a part of the Well's Fargo Bank.

The old Bank of Richmond on the corner of East Richmond Avenue and Washington Avenue was an a very important factor in early Richmond. It was the only place this side of Berkeley where a working man could cash his pay check. The Standard Oil (Chevron now) let their employees off an hour early on pay day so that they could go to the bank. I recall lines of men outside the bank on every payday. I understand that Mr. Stairley later became

postmaster in Point Richmond.

Mrs. Stairley was a rather stylish lady and was said to hare been a niece of Robert E, Lee. I recall her walking down East Richmond Ave. almost always dressed in a purple dress. The Stairleys had 2 children, a daughter and a son. The daughter married George Lee who worked in the bank and later became a local real estate and insurance man. They lived in a house on the north side of Montana Street near its upper end. This house later became the residence of the Ken Koht family. Koht had a garage on Garrard Blvd. near its junction with Standard Ave. The Lee's had one one child a daughter named Virginia. The Stairleys were southerners and Waiverly was said to have served in the Confederate army during the Civil War. He was middle aged when he came to Richmond. The voting register said he was aged 57 in 1902.

The son, Marmaduke, called Duke was a rather unusual person who I came to know quit well in his later life. I don't believe that he ever married. He seemed a little unusual and drank quite a little. He told me that he knew Jack London and drank with him down in Oakland on the waterfront. He did not have a very good opinion of London. Duke worked mostly on the bay with boats of his own and worked at times on the local dredgers. He fished, catching both fish and shrimps. I recall

once watching him fishing for shrimp in the bay area between what is now the inner and outer harbors. He ran his boat in wide circles around the shrimp area reducing the size of the circles to concentrate the shrimp in the center then catching them in his nets.

Waverly Stairley was a midle aged man when he came to Point Richmond and I recall very little about him. However, later I knew Mrs. Stairley and Duke quite well. Both were patients of mine in their later years. Stairley lived to be 102 years of age and spent her later years in a small room in on the top floor of their old residence on Montana Ave. There was a bed, an easy chair and a front widow from which she could look out on East Richmond Ave. and some of the Washington School. I doubt if she ever left this room in her later months or even years as it was at the top of a long steep flight of stairs from the floor below. However, her son Duke took good care of her. He was past 75 years of age but did a good job. I visited them several times and had some interesting talks with them. In spite of her age

Mrs Stairley was quite alert and rational.

I recall Duke sitting in the main floor of the old house listening to a radio. The radio was an old crystal set, very antique and had to be listened to with a head set and had to be adjusted with the cat's whisker. We had several talks and he gave me some old historic mementos. I believe, at that time, that he was the last person alive that knew professor Botts and had seen his airship.

When Mrs. Stairley died, the daughter, Mrs. Lee, decided to sell the old house and Duke had to move out. He lived here almost all of his life. Duke then moved into a small two roomed shack down in the inner harbor between Cutting Blvd. and the harbor waterfront. He seemed content and I visited him there several times and helped him when I could. I heard later that the family put him in a rest home where he later died. Duke was an unusual person and probably was well past 80 years when he passed away.

The Stairley family was a remarkable family and quite important in early Point Richmond history.

Kid's Reunion Committee Report

Al Fredericks passed away recently. Al was known by all of us in the 1930's as he was an auto mechanic working for Ken Koht in Ken's Auto Shop. Ken owned the garage that was located at the junction of Cutting and Carrard Boulevards. I can't recall the name of the garage. Both Ken and Al left the auto garage business and went to work for the City of Richmond at the same trade, auto mechanic.

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The Maritime Warehouse located on Castro Street is a thing of the past. The huge wooden complex as long as a football field is no longer there. I can't understand why one of Richmond's "Forty Thieves" didn't purchase the building. A used lumber outfit from Arizona got the prize. It was built before the start of World War 2 by the U.S. Government for the United States Maritime Commission for use by their Four Richmond Shipyards. After the war, it was purchased by a prominent Standard Oil Company stockholder. In my time it was known as the Kelham Warehouse. All types of war Materials were stored there for World War 2, the Korean and Viet Nam Wars.

I was a crewman on an ammunition ship that was loading bombs and ammunition at Port Chicago before the disaster on July 14, 1944.
