## APRIL 18, 1906

"The Bay Area was heavily shaken by an earthquake at 5:13 AM today which lasted for 48 seconds. The damage was greatest in San Francisco where fires broke out at various places. Since the water mains were broken, the fires were soon out of control and a conflagration resulted. "

During the three-day fire, Pointers would climb Washington Avenue to what was known as Loomis' Park ( a few wooden benches to give prospective lot buyers a view of the bay -- also to get your wind back after climbing the hill). The bay was calm during the three days and nights, and the fire reflected on the waters of the bay. The Call building and the Fairmont Hotel were spectacular sights, with flames shooting from their upper stories. Nothing could be seen during the daytime because of the smoke.

Damage was light in Richmond, with only a few chimneys and walls cracked. However, considerable damage to the brickwork throughout the Standard Oil Refinery was noticeable. A wire to the Bayonne, New Jersey refinery brought six bricklayers here in a short time. One of them was Mr. Harry Marland, who still resides in Mira Vista. The picture from which the cover sketch was made was taken by Mr. Marland a few days after he arrived in Richmond, April 20, 1906.

from Mr. John D. Rockefeller ordered the construction of a refugee camp to accomodate 500 persons from San Fran

Work was begun on April 21, at sur. rise, and by sunset three buildings had been built and completely furnished with cots, blankets, food and utensils, and, in addition, an American flag flew from the flagpole in front of the office. A huge banner was hung across the front of the building with "Camp Rockefeller" painted on it.

Hundreds of refugees and their families lived here until jobs were found, as the clean-up of the city began.

Two pictures of the camp are on dis play at the Richmond Museum.
