AT SUNRISE

Easter, more than any other Holiday we celebrate, symbolizes hope. In a gesture of fellowship, three Point Richmond churches will together begin the day of hope at Kellers Beach, with a sunrise service, at 6:30 a.m. Everyone is welcomed to join them in their worship while the sun rises on the Bay.

The First Methodist Church, Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church, and the Point Richmond Baptist Church invite you to join them in the first service of the day.

AFTER NOON

The Francesco Chamber Trio, consisting of three of the West Coast's finest musicians, violinist David Abel, cellist Bonnie Hampton and pianist Nathan Schwartz, will present a special Easter Recital at 3:30 April 14, in the Recital Hall of the Music Building at Contra Costa College.

Now in its third season, the trio is becoming more and more widely acclaimed throughout the west coast area.

In their Sunday recital, they will perform Beethoven's Trio in G Major, Arnold Elston's Piano Trio (written in 1987), and Brahms' Trio in B Major, Opus 8.

The concert is another community service, and it is open to the public, free of charge.

EVENING

A special Easter Concert, at 8 p.m. on Easter Sunday, April 14, will be presented at the First Methodist Church.

The "Messe Solenelle" by Charles Gounod (St. Cecelia's Mass), will feature soloists Virginia Cherniak, Richard Meyer and Basil Cherniak. Oliver Ellsworth will provide the organ music, and the Methodist Church choir, under the direction of Bill Farmer will sing in this complete presentation of the beautiful Easter Mass. Admission is free, with a reception following the concert.

EVE

The Richmond Art Center opens a new exhibit the day before Easter, with a reception from 5 to 8 p.m. Exhibiting Paintings and drawings by Sonya Rapoport, whose compositions look like mus ic sounds, and massive metal sculptur by Armand Trahan will be exhibited, through May 5. Both artists have exhibited and received awards throughout th west coast, and to some extent in the east. Sonya Rapoport is a Berkeley resident, born in Boston Massachusetts Mr. Trahan, who presents his first one-man exhibit of metal sculpture, is a Martinez, California resident, born in Southbridge, Massachusetts.

THE DAY THAT
FRANKLIN RCOSEVELT
VISITED RICHMOND

The headlines of the Record Herald of April 16, 1914, reads, "ASSISTANT NAVAL HEAD COMING TO THIS CITY".

"Assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt, who is on a tour of inspection of the Eay Area, will be a guest of the City of Richmond tomorrow. The visit was arranged by the Richmond Industrial Commission through Rear Admiral Charles F. Pond.

"Mayor Ludwig will
make all arrangements
to meet and entertain
the Naval Chief. Permission has been granted by Supt. L.D. Dimi
of the Standard Cil Conpany to permit a torpedo boat destroyer to
make fast at the Stan-

dard Oil wharf. Roosevelt will visit the mammoth oil refinery and other points of interest. He will take up the matter of a fuel depot and will inspect the site for a modern Naval base on the water-front between the Richmond Annex tract and the town of Albany.

"In a San Francisco speech, Roose-velt said, 'A Naval base will be established on the bay of San Francisco. We have always counted on the people here as understanding why we had to have a Navy. Before the Panama Canal became a concrete fact, the problem of the

Pacific Coast had been a serious matter, and one, moreover, that had giver naval officials and experts many sleepless nights.'"

Went Richmond Should have designs

"We shall have a great naval base on the bay of San Francisco. Just where, is the question for the future, and there are many things to be considered before it can be decided."

Assistant Secretary Roosevelt arrived at the Standard Oil Point Orient Dock at 10 o'clock a.m. on April 17,

and was met by Mayor Ludwig, other city officials, Superintendent Dimm and other Standard Oil officials. Tney were taken on a tour of the Richmond waterfront, from Point San Pablo to Foint Potrero and then on. to Point Isabel. Secretary Roosevelt told Mayor Ludewig that he had occasion to study a map of Richmond and vicinity before he left Washington and was somewhat familiar with the lay of the land, but he was agr reeably surprised at what he saw here.

He stated that the Inner Harbor was an ideal one for deep water ships

and the vicinity of Point Isabel would make a good naval base. (Mare Island received the base.) After a tour of the Refinery and the site of a fuel oil base, (Point Molate, which didn't get it until World War II), the group departed for Berkeley. The local group accompanied them as far as Berkeley and returned here shortly after 1 p. m."
