



''KOZY KOVE IS RAIDED-NOTHING FOUND''

May 29, 1922...

"Two raids conducted by the Richmond police yester day yeilded nothing in the way of evidence,

During the afternoon, police raided Kozy
Kove, an amusement park and beach here, but
a thorough search of the premises failed to
reveal anything in the beverage line not permitted under the Volstead law. The raid was
conducted about 3:30 in the afternoon during the
course of a dance and picnic. Manager Crow
declared today that the police included his private residence and other residences in the
search, and were very thorough, coming back
twice to his place. He declared he had not
permitted any violation of the dry law at the Kove
and the raid was unwarranted. "



There will be a children's film shown in the library tomorrow at ll:10. It is a 30-minute, color, Walt Disney film titled NIOK. It is a moving adventure about a jungle boy's devotion to a baby elephant deserted in a forest by its parents. His greatest sacrifice comes when he sets it free rather than see it sold into captivity.

Thus begins SIEGE by Edwin Corley, a novel that reads like next week's newspaper. A great city lies under siege. An expertly trained black militant army has taken over the island of Manhattan. Their goal: a separate state for American Negroes. The reader sees how the takeover is planned, prepared for and carried off. The story builds from page to page, chapter to chapter as the conflicting forces threaten to tear America apart.

THE SURVIVORS by Anne Edwards concerns Luanne Woodrow, sole survivor of the mass muder of six members of her family. As the book opens she is leaving the protective walls of a rest home for the first time since the tragedy ten years ago. Hans Aldick appears, a kind man, interested in Luanne only because he is writing a book about the Woodrow murders. Soon he comes to care for the confused, shy girl and together they begin to unravel her horrible past. The author balances the solution of the plot against Luanne's precarious sanity in one of the most suspenseful novels of the year!

SNATCH by Rennie Airth is a hilarious adventure of fumbling felony introducing a very gifted new name to the ranks of comic



thriller writers. With a scherzo of a plot that might have gone down as the kidnapping caper of the century, it features the most unlikely bunch of criminals since the days of Damon Runyon;

Harry, in the "ticket business" (forging passports), is happily pursuing his comparatively innocent career until his is blackmailed into a far more precarious, nefarious scheme by the vulturish and cunning ... Morland, who rents a swarthy Italian baby (from its parents) to substitute for the real son a of a fabulously rich Egyptian tycoon (friend of kings, Prince of Ponces), assisted by the voluptuous and stunning ... . Paula, tough redhead with good legs, mock mother of each child as the occasion demands. A fast, foxy book, SNATCH is sure to delight everyone who has the good luck to come across it. It has already been snatched up for a forthcoming major motion picture that promises to rank alongside "The Lavender Hill Mob. "



"Carmina Burana" means "Songs of Beuren" after the monastery in Southern Germany where the profane poems, the basis for Carl Orff's musical production that uses full orchestra, chorus, soloists and ballet were found. Written by vagrant scholars, vagabond poets and wandering monks of the 13th century, the poems celebrate the rites of spring, alcohol, and love.

The production will be directed by Dr. Randolph Hunt of the Merritt College Music department and will feature guest artists: Joan Smith, soprano, Orva Hoskinson, tenor, James Tippey, baritone; and the music of Arthur Fletcher, piano, in "Nocturnes" by John Fields, with the ballet.
