



THE TIME FOR ACTION IS HERE--Literally! The Bay Area Air Pollution Control Board will meet here in Richmond on MIARCH 4 - this Wednesday!

The Board which usually meets in San Francisco, is coming to Richmond especially because of the number of requests by Richmond residents, and especially the "Stop Smog Committee" of Richmond, who wished to make it possible for residents of this area to make their feelings about air pollution in our area known to the Board.

THE TIME IS WEDNESDAY

MARCH 4 at 10 A. M. at the City Council Chambers, 3rd floor, City Hall, Civic Center, Richmond Calif.

The Stop Smog Committee states in its information about the meeting....

"If we are to change the apathetic attitude of the smog board about industrial pollution, we must show them that a large number of people really care about their air. We need a big turnout. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. in the Richmond City Council Chambers. Come at 9:30 and bring a picket sign.

"We already have contacted a number of groups and individuals to speak that day, and we hope that there will be many more as well. If you would like to testify, write Peter Tamaras, Secretary, BAAPCD, 939 Ellis Street, San Francisco and ask to speak that day. Time is quite short, so hurry. Usually such a request is necessary before the Board will hear a lay speaker; however, there is a possibility that the Board will have an "open mike" at this meeting.

"If you speak, please confine your remarks to Contra Costa County, industrial and stationary sources (cars are not within the smog board's authority) and your hopes of getting some action from this most confused Board."

A recently introduced bill (AB 641) would make the smog board directly elected. One big problem in dealing with the Board seems to be that, because they are all appointees, very little effective pressure can be brought by the public. Passage of the bill could do a great deal, in making the Board more responsible and thus in using its powers to control smog.

The Bay Area Air Pollution Control
Board claims that our district is doing
as good a job or better, than the Los Angeles area...but these statistics are alarming, especially considering the fact
that Los Angeles contains nearly 7 million people, and the Bay Area, 4 million.

*2012 tons of hydrocarbons go into Bay Area air daily, nearly equalling the 2650 tons in L.A. Half of that here is from stationary, controllable sources, compared to a third in L.A.

*198 tons of particulates are released in the Bay Area compared to 119 tons in L.A. Half of ours comes from stationary sources, as opposed to less than a third in L.A.

*440 tons of corrosive sulfur dioxide go into Bay Area skies every day. Los Angeles receives 306 tons.

Usually, our area enjoys comparing themselves to Los Angeles, which makes statistics like those above particularly revolting.

Tenth Street....."



Plans

The meeting concerning plans for the future Field House at Washington School Park on Thursday night took place at the Plunge. Recreation and Parks Director Joseph Salvato, Hindsey Strout, and Karl Henning attended from the Recreation and Park Department, accompanied by architect for the building, Mr. Komatsu.

The building is to be approximately 16 to 18, hundred square feet in size (40' by 40' for instance). It would be approximately the size of the El Cerrito Field houses, such as the one located in the Arlington Park. The approximately \$50,000 set aside for the building will not include accessories in the building, which will come from other funds. Approximately \$10,000 of the total amount will go toward architectural and design fees, and detailed plans and drawings.

Several suggestions were given by the audience present at the meeting, mostly as to equipment and provisions for activities to be provided by the building. However, the more exotic equipment, as provisions for dark rooms, ceramic supplies -- kilns, etc., would not likely be part of the construction costs, and would have to be added later, if and when needed, according to the Recreation and Parks directors. Construction costs will take up much if not all of the \$40,000 allotted for the building.c There was some hostility from the audience, although the designs and plans have not been shown, and the purpose for the meeting was to receive ideas, not judgments. The Park representatives stated that they would again meet with people of Point Richmond before finalizing plans, with the hope that more citizens will be interested and attend that meeting.

WATCH FOR FALLING HILLS

Readers of Point Counterpoint are familiar with the Monday morning walking tours scheduled by the Contra Costa Shoreline Parks Committee. The series was initiated on February 2 with a hike along the hills from Nicholl Nob to Ferry Point then back along the Potrero ridge to relish the views of land and water that will one day soon be part of the Point Richmond Regional Park.

This February morning was warm and bright with the clarity of early spring when the air is most often swept by breezes off the land. This land we walked was "the" park. Our park. Admittedly still prospective, yet with all the emotional impact of real park existence to those who made the walk, complete with soft green blanket underfoot, bright poppies and new growth on the pine trees that Point people planted in the fall. It was an exhilharating walk, a visual joy.

Perhaps this made the sad side of the morning only seem more grim; for everywhere one looked were evidences of the cruel and devastating attacks made by man and motor on these hills.

The motorcycle damage is familiar to those who have long heard the rip of motors slicing the quiet of the weekend air, forcing attention to the erosion that accompanies their destruction of the turf.

Less widely recognized is the drastic damage done to the slope at the east end of the Potrero Ridge on property owned by the Richfield Oil Company. This is where the bluff oldtimers know as Bull Dog Point once projected bluntly above the bay. Here Quarry Products Co. has cut steep and deep into the hill. As previously reported in Point Counterpoint, even the government marker was dislodged by quarry action when too much material was removed from the ridge.

On this glorious February morning the sturdy little band of walkers with their cameraman faced a bleak sight at the quarry. The slippage was severe. It looked as if the whole face of the hill would drop away. A crevice eight feet deep had split along the crest.

City Manager, Planning Director and Councilmen were contacted. Councilman Vargas asked for an immediate survey. At his request, Contra Costa Shoreline Parks president, Louise Hammond, received a copy of the staff report filed by the Department of Public Works.

"The ground at the ridgeline has settled up to four feet. The earth slippage is taking place at the east side of the ridgeline."

The report continues to state that Quarry Products Inc., is operating on a Use Permit issued November 17, 1960. The only conditions are "that the operation should not generate dust or have any other adverse effect on neighboring property." (underlining ours.)

On July 17, 1969, "while investigating earlier earth slippage" the Planning Commission found by unanimous vote that Quar ry Products had complied with the conditions of the use permit. At the same meeting the Planning Commission put over until August 30, 1970, any further consideration of conformance by the quarry to the Special Features Additive District which theoretically covers this area, but from which Quarry Products has been exempted as a prior use. This means in simple terms that Quarry Products had embarked on its program of destruction before the ordinance was enacted and therefore was allowed to continue its desecration until the end! No matter that a hill can never be rebuilt, that every man's property in Richmond is adversely affected by this loss as well as the property of citizens of El Cerrito,&Berkeley whose views command the Richmond hills.

Contra Costa Shoreline Parks Committee wishes to thank Councilman Vargas for his interest in the Richmond hills. CCSP Committee is also compelled to ask, "Will there be any "Neighboring property" left by August 1970 when the Planning Commission deigns to consider again the problem of the quarry?

Should immediate steps be taken by the City requiring Quarry Products to establish terraces and plantings to protect the quarry slopes? Why should quarries be allowed on

our precious Richmond hills? Neighboring /2. cities have all outlawed quarrying long ago.

The ecological significance of these Richmond hills, their visual importance to Richmond and the entire bay area, and their relationship to the Point Richmond Regional Park all call for immediate attention!



Becoming involved, deeply involved, with other human beings is a thing to be avoided at all costs, in many people's opinions. Extremes of this attitude sometimes are cited in the news -- instances when a crime was committed with people witnessing, but turning away from, the scene where they could have been of assistance.

Examples of the opposite extreme seldom appear in newspapers. People deeply involved in the lives around them are not sensational -- only rare. Such people live in a charming old house at 39 Nicholl Avenue in Point Richmond. They have resided here since they found themselves both commuting to Richmond to work.

Judy Coleman, originally from Mansfield Ohio, attended Knox College in Galesburg, Illinois. After teaching for a year, she entered the University of Chicago, and there met her husband, Allan Coleman, who came to the University from Boseman, Montana.

The Coleman's came to California so that Allan could carry on his graduate studies at UC in Berkeley. He began working at the Ronoh School for emotionally handicapped children in Richmond, and became director of that school a few years ago. He conducts the school with a staff of thirteen, which includes teachers and psychiatric assistants, plus some volunteer help.

The Ronoh School is located on Thirteenth Street, between Changlor and Bissell. Thition is paid on a percentage of income basis by the parents, with the aid of Short-Doyle funds. The challenge of directing a school for young emotionally disturbed children is a great one.

Judy, who worked formerly at the Arlington Community Church, teaches each morning at the Maritime Children's Center. She is active in Citizens for Excellence in Education, in the Greater Richmond Interfaith Program (GRIP), as well as being actively interested in any phase of community improvement that requires involvement. She is helping the new community program called the Community Resource Mart, which is described in today's paper.

Involvement in the community and their church consumes most of the lives of the Coleman's. The only exception

Personal involvement with other human beings, in the community and in their church, describes the lives of the Coleman's; with perhaps one exception -- a recent hobby taken up by Judy -- making men's ties. But it may be her way of getting other people involved -- the wearer of one of her decorative creations would never be ignored.

Resource Mart

Somewhere in this community tonight a child will sleep on a cold floor, a mother will prepare a meal without a stove.

How can you help? By giving...giving that which you no longer need. It's easy. Just call the Community Resource Mart at 237-5112, at any hour. A fireman will come to your door to pick up a bed, a stove, a refrigerator or any unusable furniture. He will see that it is delivered to one of the many who need it desperately.

The Community Resource Mart is an unique new program resulting from discussion begun last summer by members of the Fire Fighters Local 188 and the Human Relations division of the City of Richmond in collaboration with the California State Service Center and Contra Costa County Social Service.

It arose from the knowledge that in Richmond today there are people sleeping on flors, people existing without refrigerators, stoves, heat, washers, other furniture. Various community agencies have been aware that many homes desperately need these basic furnishings. Due to lack of funds they have been only slightly successful in correcting the situation. It was at this point that the community acted. A self-help program was initiated using an answering service for referrals, volunteer firemen to pick up items, a warehouse donated by the Richmond Redevelopment agency for storage and repair, and a delivery service to those families in need.

The organizations responsible for this community action include the Bachelors IV, the Welfare Rights Organization, Arlington Community Church, Neighborhood House, People Pledged for Progress, in addition to the groups mentioned above.

This program will be administered by these agencies but only the community can make it work. The number to call is 237-5112.
