






Railroad Avenue in 1903

Church News

HAPPY NEW YEAR and welcome to 2012. How quickly 2011 passed.

The next generation is preparing to receive the Sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation. At present, 20 are preparing to receive First Holy Communion.

A Children's Liturgy is ongoing each Sunday during Mass. The children are tutored by Margaret Morkowski, assisted by Jennifer Rosier. All children are invited to attend. A few Sundays ago, the children attended the first part of the Mass with their parents and then left for the church hall – some left willingly and some needed a parent's hand to guide them.

Along with the economy, our income has fallen somewhat, but we were able to pay the obligatory bills and still keep our heads above water. When it comes to the economy, we too are affected. We give thanks to a number of generous parishioners. The Parish is small, but showing signs of increased attendance. We may be small, compared to others, but we are blessed with some very generous parishioners.

The Point Richmond Art Society meets in the church hall. They deserve credit for encouraging local artists and arranging exhibits around town. We appreciate having the upbeat, colorful and creative presence among us.

It did not take long for Father to realize the pluses of Pt. Richmond. He frequents the Plunge on a regular basis and confirms that it is a great way to start the day and retain mobility of the body.

We have experienced several baptisms. Father has had the honor of baptizing 80 children and are into our third register which began in 1972. The other register went back to 1943, and the first one begins on October 10, 1902. The baptisms are presently listed alphabetically and indexed. In the past, church records were very important, since they were usually the only records kept. Among those recently baptized were: Corinelise Sara Buie, the daughter of Jeff and Paulette and Haley Anne Howard, the daughter of Anthony and Christine. Both of the girls have brothers who were also baptized at Our Lady of Mercy.

If you wish to register as a parishioner, forms are available in the entry way. If you live within the parish's legal boundaries, you are by church law already a member. For details, visit the webpage: pointrichmondcatholic.org.

We continue to support the Souper Kitchen and also collect clothing for the same. Your contributions are always accepted. If you have clothing to donate, you may leave it by the church hall door.

We thank the Gateway Foundation for awarding Our Lady of Mercy a grant which was used to preserve the gothic design on the back porch of the church. At about the same time the back porch on the rectory showed signs of dry rot, etc., and was replaced.

Christmas is now a memory, but we must comment on the beauty of the church during this season. The Pointsettas were a donation by a generous parishioner and many hands worked on beautifying the interior for the Christmas services. During this season, a Ceremony of Carols was held, which was in the traditional form of vespers. It was led by three musicians – soprano, violin, and piano.

During Advent our Lady of Mercy Giving Tree sat in the back of the church and received many donations which were given to the Family House at Children's Hospital, Oakland. Nancy and Stanley Toledo chair the giving tree and transport the donations to the hospital. Thanks is extended to the Toledo's who continue to chair the tree each year.

In all the years that Brenda McKinley and I have hosted the first Sunday coffee/donuts get together, we have never missed a month – 2012 being the exception. The New Year fell on a Sunday and the donut supplier was closed for the holiday. It was a first for all of us.

Our Parish Secretary, Beth Lewin, works behind the scenes, but is responsible for keeping all the official aspects of parish life well organized. We are fortunate to have her.

A parishioner is willing to lend us a very high quality grand piano for use in the church. The big question is whether it will or will not fit and whether the weight can be supported. At this point, it is a matter of discussion.

Contribution envelopes for 2012 are available in the entry to the church. Parishioners using envelopes may pick up their assigned envelope boxes and new users may select a box and register on the sheet provided on the table. At the end of January, parishioners using the envelopes will receive a detailed list of all 2011 contributions.

On the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the parish in 1952, the parish purchased a silver chalice, engraved in honor of the Parish Pioneers. With continued use, it was in need of restoration. The restoration was recently done and was quite costly. It is a tradition to offer parishioners the opportunity to help cover the costs used at Mass in memory of deceased relatives.

A few weeks ago the Chronicle pictured an

old Nissan Pathfinder and its owner. Father David could also qualify for such a picture, since his 1994 Nissan Pathfinder with 198,000 miles on it just left the shop with a new transmission.

A watercolor class is scheduled for Saturday, February 5. Father has a DVD with a few lessons on it by an absolute genius at catching the shapes of his subjects without obsessing.

Last year, Tom Sindicich did a marvelous job of restoring the Station of the Cross, which fell off of the wall. It has not yet been put back in place since it needs to be repainted, which requires funds that we do not presently have.

Continue to remember in your prayers: John Gerk, Al Frosini, Vince Kafka, Bill Smith, Frankie Mello and Dody Perry.


Condolences are also extended to son-in-law, Kevin Knee, in the recent death of his mother, Peggy. Memorial services will be held in Pittsburgh, PA.

An urgent concern for the people who live at Camp Ashraf in Iraq led to a rally at the White House on December 12. Jill Jenice, Jean, Ensieh, Parviz, and Ali attended the rally, along with a couple thousand other people from across the

country. Since the rally, Nouri al-Maliki, Prime Minister of Iraq, has extended the deadline for all people to leave the Camp from December 31, 2011, to April 2012. Hopefully, Iraqi security forces will help Ashraf residents have a safe and easy transfer to other countries where they will be welcome. Pastor Dan, Linda Andrew-Marshall, Norm and Jean Reynolds recorded a song used as part of the sound track in a video to help encourage the people of Ashraf.

It will be given by Marceil DeLacy, CSB, a practitioner and teacher of Christian Science from Seattle, Washington. Maybe you have questions on what Christian Scientists believe, or about healing through prayer without using medicine. Is a spiritual form of healthcare safe and effective, and how does it work? POINT METHODIST CHURCH HISTORY Mid Dornan

Church history is rich with contributions of women. One church group in the 1920s was the SOCIAL LEAGUE of the First Methodist Episcopal Church whose history is reflected in their minutes printed below and taken from the canvass covered, red leather cornered notebook which cost \$1.15. The minutes are printed as written,

SEPT 3, 1929

The first meeting of he new year, of the Social League was held in the church parlors, preceded by our regular luncheon. There were (blank) members present. Our new president, Mrs. Monette Dixon (?) presided. The minutes of the last Dec. meeting were read and approved .

A report from the auditing committee was given with both the secretary and treasurers book balancing. The treasurer gave the following report.

For the past summer months-

113.09 - collected

81.76 - expended

31.33 - balance

<u>22.50</u> - old balance when the books were turned over

\$ 53.83 - new balance

The president spoke of having a sick committee, called the Sunshine Committee and asked Mrs. Brothers to send cards to any sick member in the Point and Mrs. Mythen to look after any in Richmond. All expenses of the card to be paid by the League.

As the next league meeting was to be at the Methodist Church in Albany, Mrs. Prince acting as hostess, the matter of transportation was brought to our attention. Mrs. Owens was appointed to see that all members from the Point were provided for and Mrs. Scofield all those from Richmond. This luncheon was to be a pot luck one and each was asked what her dish would be so as to have a balanced diet.

A motion was put before the house, as to whether the S.L.should pay for having the dishes washed at each regular meeting, not to exceed \$1.00. After discussing the question, the motion

was withdrawn and no action taken.

Mrs Scofield reported that a potted plant had been sent to Mrs. Green, Mrs Oehnes' father. The matter of the January food sale was discussed. Mrs. Gill reported that the seat for the lavatory would be gratis when a shipment was received.


It was suggested by the president and endorsed by the members that each hostess plan their own entertainment for their day.





The end of 2011 marked the end of the first full calendar year of the Plunge Masters adult and the Richmond Sailfish youth swim clubs. Both teams formed in 2010 after the Richmond Natatorium - "The Plunge" - reopened in new glory after its massive retrofit and renovation. The many accomplishments of the Sailfish Club can be shared another time, and I will focus this article on the Richmond Plunge Masters, RPM. RPM is affiliated nationally with U.S. Masters Swimming and regionally with the Pacific Masters. Ultimately, the club membership numbered 76 swimmers for 2011.

Masters swimming offers people a variety of gifts depending on their goals: fitness, coaching, competition, and camaraderie. People come to Masters swimming with various abilities and experiences. Coach John Schonder, a competitive swimmer since age five, is able to teach basic principles of the four competition strokes, give swimmers of all levels coaching to further hone their skills, and help triathlon and open water swimmers create an appropriate training plan. He balances a love of competitive swimming with an understanding that all team members do not choose to compete. Through themes for weekly workouts and bi-monthly Saturday clinics, RPM will increase emphasis on swim technique and instruction this year. Some Saturday clinics will incorporate video recording above and under water to help analyze and improve swimmers' techniques. In 2012, RPM swimmers are encouraged to keep a personal swim log. Swimmers who complete 100 miles, 200 miles, or

300+ miles during the year will be awarded certificates.

Some swimmers practice in the bay for open water swimming events or just for fun. September 2011, Richmond Swims hosted its second annual open water swim, Keller Cove Swim for Kids' Sake, to raise money for the Richmond Sailfish youth team. 116 swimmers signed up for the race (twice as many as last year); 26 were members of the Richmond Plunge Masters. The event t-shirt featured artwork from local artist Jim deWitt. Local business sponsors for the event included: Veolia, Questa, Bay Marine, Sports Basement, SunPower, Summit Defense, Mechanics Bank, Interactive Resources, Richmond Sanitary, Golden Bear Transfer Station, West County Resource Recovery, Smith Solutions, Ginger Springs Day Spa, GU Energy Gel, Body Wisdom Studio, and CLIF Bars & Team members and Sailfish team Company. parents volunteered to clean Keller beach, welcome participants, register swimmers, distribute swim bags and timing chips, staff a swimmers' aid station, sell t-shirt, and time the race to make the event a success. Race results were divided by age. sex and whether or not the swimmer wore a wet suit: of the swimmers from Richmond Plunge Masters, 15 placed first, 2 placed second, 4 placed third, and 3 placed fourth in their division. RPM finished in the top ten (in a field of over 100 clubs) in the season-long open water points competition in our region mainly due to points earned by RPM members in the Keller Cove Swim for Kids' Sake event

While competition is optional as a Masters' team member, RPM swimmer Ron Taylor participated in Pacific Masters pool competitions during the year, and Kamala Appel competed in several open water events. Alyssa Newman won her individual age group category for the season, and finished her first Ironman-type Triathlon (the Vineman in Guerneville) last summer, thanks in part to her newfound swimming skills under John's coaching and her committed training.

On January 21, 2012, the Olympic Club of San Francisco hosted a 1500-meter swim meet, the first of the new year. RPM members Jennie Smythe, John Schonder, and Steven Westcott all placed in their age divisions.

Early in September, city staff installed a bulkhead - a barrier placed across the width of the pool - to increase our lap distance from 20 yards (the pool width) to 25 yards (the end of the pool to the bulkhead.) Thus equipped, the lane distance at the Plunge is suitable to host swim meets, and the teams are able to practice standard competition distances. The club purchased one diving block in 2011 and recently Norm Hantzsche donated another, but five more are needed before the team can host a meet.

In October, swimmers did a 30-minute freestyle swim for distance. The recorded distances will be used as a baseline for a future 30-minute test. Since October, swimmers can build strength using hand paddles crafted by experts Bob Carlson and Max Rapoport at Carlson River Boards and provided to the team at a low cost. Coach John

assembled the paddles; many RPM members use them at every practice.

To keep swim fees down, support the Sailfish youth, and purchase some needed equipment, the Plunge Masters plan some fundraising activities during the year. Besides the Keller Cove Swim for Kids' Sake, scheduled for September 16, the team plans to participate in the Point Richmond Garage Sale, hosted annually on Memorial Day by the Masquers Theater.

The Board of Directors of "Richmond Swims", a non-profit operating under the financial umbrella of "Richmond Friends of Recreation," expects in time to have its own separate 501.c.3 status. The current Board of Directors, which oversees RPM and the Sailfish youth team, includes volunteers Jonathan Mayer, President; Norm Hantzsche, Vice President; Nancy Malone, Secretary; Margaret Morkowski, Treasurer; Beth Miller, Member at Large (RPM); Alfredo Deloa, Member at Large (Sailfish Parent); and paid staff member, John Schonder, Head Coach.

I recently learned that humans, unlike most other primates, are especially able to regulate their breathing to make underwater swimming possible. As I swim with Richmond Plunge Masters, I am finally using that innate ability. It feels right!

The team holds practice every weekday at noon, three times a week at 6:00 p.m., twice per week at 6:00 a.m. and on Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Come on down, regulate your breathing, and join the fun!





He portrayed her on her lunch break, eating a sandwich but with her rivet gun atthe ready, lying across her lap. On her lunch box, Rockwell had painted the name, "Rosie". How had he come to choose that name for his larger-than-life riveting heroine?

#311 Rosie the Riveter Pt. 5

Rosie becomes a household name and steps into history

If you had to pick a birthday for Rosie the Riveter, you could very well say that she was born in Chicago on Friday, January 15, 1943.

On that date, a popular quartet calling themselves The Four Vagabonds went into a studio to record two songs they had prepared for the session. There was a hitch, though. At the last minute, the composer of the songs refused to give them permission to record his tunes and it looked as though the session would be canceled.

Although the Vagabonds were a well-known group with fan clubs from coast to coast, unlike the other big stars of the time, they didn't do much recording. Instead, they concentrated on live appearances on radio. With an astounding fifteen hundred songs in their repertoire, great flexibility, and their ability to prepare new songs quickly, they were in demand. They'd been singing together for almost ten years and had perfected their harmonies to blend their voices into a single smooth stream of melodic sound. By 1943, they were regulars on the ABC Radio Network and best known nationally for their daily appearances on the very popular hour-long, five-morning-a-

week, *Don MacNeill's Breakfast Club* where they sang three songs each broadcast and participated in the on-air comedy.

On this particular day when the four singers went to the RCA Victor Company's Chicago recording studio and learned that the songs they had worked up could not be recorded, they must have been disappointed since their agreement with the Bluebird label, a subsidiary of RCA Victor, was \$3000 for each recording session. Perhaps that's why when the record company executives approached them with sheet music for two substitute songs, they agreed to look them over on the spot. They spent some time going over the music to see how the songs might be presented, experimenting with the harmonies and then told the record company executives that if they could have one hour more to work on the arrangements for the two songs, they'd be ready to record. Rosie the Riveter

The Four Vagabonds had asked for an hour to prepare "Rosie" and "Rose of Charing Cross". When their hour was up, they were ready to step up to the microphone. Not only did they keep to their schedule but they nailed each of the songs on the first take. When you listen to their imaginative arrangement of "Rosie", complete with sound effects made by the singers, you can appreciate their achievement.

"Rosie the Riveter", almost overlooked had been discovered in an emergency and had begun her career by setting a production record!

The song was released the next month and was an immediate hit. People recognized in this Rosie the spirit that had led their daughters, sisters, wives and sweethearts to go out into the workplace to do "men's jobs" as a way of participating in the war effort.

As the song played out over millions of radios and Victrolas across the nation, newspapers and newsreels began looking for hometown Rosies of their own and discovered many of the inspiring stories mentioned earlier in this series.

With this sort of popularity, it seemed only natural that Norman Rockwell would decide that a woman working as a riveter would be an appropriate subject for the Saturday Evening Post cover he had been commissioned to produce. Of course, his cover was a great hit, too.

It was probably only a matter of time before Hollywood would take advantage of Rosie's growing renown. In 1944, Republic Pictures released a movie version, starring Jane Frazee and Frank Albertson, a comedy in which four women working in a factory share a boarding house with four men, each sex trying to take charge over who gets to use the house for what, and when. TV Guide's review says it is "Pretty silly but harmless".

What was not at all silly though, were the results of the work done by millions of Rosies across the country who were helping the US win the production battles in what had become a war for survival for the US and allies.

Helene Raffanelli Frosini was born in Point Richmond October 19,1920. She died January 16, 2012. She lived in Point Richmond her entire life. She attended Washington Elementary School, Roosevelt Junior High School and graduated from Richmond Union High School in 1938. While a sophomore in high school, she met the "Fred Astair of Point Richmond". Al Frosini. a senior at the time. The initial meeting began a long love affair with dancing before, during, and after school. The result of this meeting was her falling in love with her best dance partner, Al. They married on July 13,1942. When Al joined the Army, Helene joined the war effort and was employed at the Explosive Manufacturing Operations, a torpedo producer. However, after horrifying experiences with three major explosions at the factory, one in which she was the sole survivor, she asked for and received a safer job working in the office. She worked there until the war ended and Al returned home. 1947 was an important year for Helen and Al. They welcomed the birth of their daughter, Valerie and also purchased their restaurant, "Al's Fountain" at the corner of Santa Fe and Tewksbury Avenue in Point Richmond. Helene, "the Boss", turned the restaurant into a successful eatery which they operated for 32 years. Helene and Al were long time members of The Galileo Club and The Point Richmond History Association. Helene was an avid golfer and a member of the Franklin Canyon Golf Course. She had the distinction of making a "hole in one", and won many local tournaments. Helene is survived by her daughter, Valerie, and son-in- law Jerry Gutierrez, three grandchildren, two great-grandchildren; three nephews and one niece. Her Memorial Service was held on January 28 at St. Joseph Cemetery.
