

HOW THE TUNNEL HAPPENED

(This series of articles from the Richmond Independent shows the progress of the Municipal Tunnel on Garrard....)

Nov. 20 : THE TUNNEL AND HARBOR BONDS CARRIED BY A 7 to 1 MARGIN.

"The Boosters owned the city last evening. The Independent and the Richmond Industrial Committee burned many hundred pounds of red fire on Nicholl Knob. A large bonfire at Washington avenue and Park Place with the ringing of bells tooting of whistles, and honking of auto horns, the boosters made merry.

Nov. 27:"A celebration, the likes of which this town has never known, is being

The petition, signed by 300 Point residents, asking for re-zoning of the area of flat land south of Garrard Tunnel, passed the Planning Commission Thursday evening; in turn, they will propose the re-zoning to the City Council. Should this pass, it will allow the East Bay Regional Park District the time to negotiate for land for a Regional Park in this area. Should they succeed in obtaining the land, a beautiful Bay Shore park will be accessible to people who don't now get the chance to enjoy the Bay.

The change in the Richmond General plan, to include the land South of the tunnel (both hill and flat area) in a park will come before the City Council on November 13. All people interested in
