
The long awaited church directory is due to be delivered on or before December 16th. It promises to be an up-to-date register of all current parishioners. Thank you to all for your patience.

The children plan to do a play "The Great Walled Village: A Christmas Play" on January 7 during worship.



# Point Methodist Church History

Church history is rich with contributions of women. One church group in the 1920's was the SOCIAL LEAGUE of the first Methodist Episcopal Church whose history is reflected in their minutes printed below and taken from the canvas covered, red leather cornered notebook which cost \$1.15. The minutes are printed as written. This is the 48th installment.

### April 20, 1926

Social League met in the church parlors with sixteen members present. Mrs. Elizabeth Jenkins and Mrs Brothers were the hostesses. It was moved and seconded and carried that bills be paid at the Park Florist 1.45

Park Florist 1.45 Laundry .57 Alberts 7.46 Mrs. Holbrook 1.00 total 10.48

It was moved, 2nd and carried that \$10.00 be donated to the colored church. Plans were started for a Reception and Tea to be given in May.

It was moved, 2nd and carried that thread needed for embroidery work be purchased at Mrs. Gnaga's, the League assuming the bills.

# Mike Canepa's Memories

Hey, thank you so much Mike. This is the sort of thing that we are asking you all to do. People enjoy reading about the way things used to be and having there own memories "jogged". Just as important you are "recording history.

Gary

1904 my grandfather Gus Canepa arrived in Point Richmond (then known as Port Richmond) and established his residence. Approximately one year later he sent for his wife Katherine (Perasso) Canepa and two children John and Michael to join him. From Silvano-D'Orba province of Alexandria Italy (Northwest of Genoa) they departed for After processing through Ellis the U.S. Island they traveled by train to the West Coast. Unfortunately the train transporting them was involved in a derailment in Colton. California. This derailment took the life of their mother (my grandmother) but both boys survived. They eventually joined their father in Port Richmond. Because of hard times their father was unable to properly care for them. A friend of my grandfather by the name of Giuseppe (Joe) Matteucci took by father Michael under his wing and helped raise him. He graduated from Washington in the Point and went to work at the Santa Fe Foundry, (original telephone #47). The foundry was located just over the railroad tracks west of Stege Grammar School. He

worked at the foundry until he passed away in 1943. My sister Pat and I lived in Mira Vista until our mother Mary remarried Salvator (Sam) De Phillips.

In 1944 my mother, Sister Pat, and I moved to the Point where we lived with our step-father Sam on Tremont Avenue upon arrival at the Point one of my objectives was to meet with Joe Matteucci, the man who took part in raising my father. Within a short time we met at his business across from the Santa Fe market. I recall walking into the pool hall and introducing myself as Michael's son. Joe and I discussed my father and the past which was one of the most memorable times in my life. Joe, a very caring and sensitive person, accepted me as famiglia.

I often think of "Papa" Joe and those who befriended me, Tony Petta, Ozzie Smith, Leo Forner, Ray Lanza, John Amantite, Jack Westman and an old salt, skipper by the name of Danny Keller. In his shanty just off the beach on his wharf, Danny would treat us to his shark steak sandwiches and a brewski, a few years short of being legal, (not the shark). In those days eating shark was not the seafood most people ate, but if you never had one of Danny's sandwiches you've missed a real treat. On occasion we would borrow one of Danny's surplus Navy lifeboats anchored just off the beach and row without lights to the S.O. Long Warf, until the night the Coast Guard chased us to Campbell's Beach where we abandoned ship. End of Story!

On the south side of the tunnel up on the hill lived Mr. Bernardi, the brother of my third grade teacher Ms. Bernardi who taught at Woodrow Wilson Grammar School. <u>A</u> teacher's teacher!

Just beyond Bernardi's was the motorcycle club, the "Richmond Ramblers" who some believed were the original "Hells Angels". No friends at that club, but we did watch the hill climbs and injuries every weekend.

At the "Nat", Georgie in the ticket office, (who sometimes acted like my gunnery SSgt. Was a real creampuff. Ralph Kendricks, an outstanding lifeguard, whom Tony and I had the pleasure to work with, saved many drowning swimmers after they had just downed a by pasta or Chinese dinner, (statistically the two main reasons for stomach cramps). Unknown to most, he was also a professional archer, bulls eye every shoot.

Thanks to locker boy Kenneth Janes who was forgetful (?) and did not lock all windows on the tunnel side, my buddy's and I did a lot of midnight swimming at the Nat.

At the Point Theater, (now the Point Orient), Anna and Mr. Schwartz who contended with our juvenile conduct, (occasionally dropping water bags from the balcony). Tony Petta, a prince of a guy, who relieved Anna in the ticket booth was our intermediary and had a way of negotiating peace with Mr. Schwartz, Got bless his soul. We all loved Anna, where infatuated with her beauty and her outstanding voice when she sang and played the organ at Father Kelly's mass in Our Lady of Mercy.


After unacceptable grades (8th) at Longfellow Jr. High and negotiating summer school with Mr. Hunn, (our principal), my parents transferred me to St. Mary's College High in Berkeley where I attended school with John Amentite. Shortly after graduation in 1949, I was hired by the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad as an apprentice in the mechanical department.

Then Came Korea!! After four years in the Air Force, returned to the railroad in southern California. Upon completion of forty years of service with the Santa Fe and seven years with the National Railroad Passenger Corporation (AMTRAK), I retired on December 1, 1994. I moved to Grass Valley, California in 1995 where my wife Francesca and I now reside.

After discovering the PRHA Web Site and reading the past issues, I deeply regret not staying in touch and communicating with my friends and acquaintances at the Point, many of whom are no longer with us. If accepted as a member, I do intend to partake in future PRHA activities.

# Red Oak Victory Ship in Richmond A Second Life. The Red Oak Report, Restoration Progress

The cargo ship Red Oak Victory,

was laid down September 9, 1944 by Permanente Metals Corp., Richmond, California, for the U.S. Maritime Commission, acquired by the U.S. Navy December 5, 1944 and commissioned the same day with Lt. Commander John S. Sayer, USNR in command.

The Red Oak was loaded with cargo and departed San Francisco for Pearl Harbor January 10, 1945. From then until the end of the war she served as an ammunition ship for various ships in the South Pacific. In 1996, the Richmond Museum of History was awarded the ship by an act of Congress. Saved from the scrap heap, restoration of the ship continues under the direction of James Nolan, the Museum Association and many dedicated volunteers.

### **Renovation of the Red Oak Victory**

This project of the Richmond Museum of History, is proceeding apace thanks to the efforts of many dedicated volunteers. Here are some of the recent highlights as reported by Michael J. Huntsinger, the Chief Mate and Restoration Manager. Exterior activities include the November 99 raising of a set of cargo gear at No. 4 hatch for the first time in over 30 years. There are seven such sets of

booms on the ship. The anchor windlass, still fully functional, has been cleaned of old paint, acided, and primed with gray two-part linear polyurethane (LP). The longitudinal support frames on the bottom have major rusting which will need repair in the future. In late December more guns were delivered, including two 3" anti aircraft guns and a 5" cannon. Two 20 mm guns have already been procured. The weapons came from former Naval Base Treasure Island and will eventually be mounted, giving the ship that authentic World War II appearance. Holes in the decking compound on the navigation bridge and the passageway aft of the radio room have been filled, eliminating major safety hazards as well as eyesores. Most of the exposed area of the after (gunners) house has now been covered with primer and finish gray paint.

Someday the whole ship will look as good as this structure! Much more work has been accomplished inside the ship and it is truly amazing to see the progress. Ship tours are given most days, weather permitting. The ship is berthed at Terminal One, near Ferry Point at the end of Dornan Drive. # Allan Smith's Point

I want to thank Mayor Rosemary Corbin for agreeing to bring back the stone that contains the John Kenny plaque which was removed from Washington Park, now known as Judge Carroll Park. She wants to know where it should be placed? I am in favor of returning it to the Judge Carroll Park where it was placed after being removed from its original site when the Richmond Parkway was built. The Judge wouldn't mind. He was known as a "nice guy", even on the bench. The alternate place to put the stone is next to the sidewalk on Tewksbury Avenue at the Castro entrance to the Point. This is near the original Kenny Park.

In 1939, there was a well known Richmond fishing boat named the "Goodship Little Caesar:. Margaret Doherty has a photo of the boat that pictures 10 local fishermen showing their striped bass limit caught in San Pablo Bay in 1939. The Captain was Caeser Malock. The Doherty's own home on Washington Avenue where the late Captain Clark once lived. The photo was fould in the basement of the home. Check out the Richmond Library for an oral history of Point Richmond and the Richmond—San Rafael Ferry given by the late Captain Allan Clark.

Richmond's Librarian was asked where is the beautiful bronze plaque that was placed at the lobby entrance to Richmond's Main Library. The plaque honors Richmond's military people who were killed during World War Two. Their names are printed on the ornamental plate. (One of these men was killed on the last day of the war). I was told that it was removed because of remodeling anticipation to the lobby. Mary Ellen Covell, Richmond Native, was informed that the removal was against possible theft.

Junior Burke, Richmond native, is a great friend of many Point people and has memories of the Point and the Standard Oil Refinery. He was asked whatever became of the large statue of a Polar Bear that was placed in front of the Refinery's original hospital, and was seen by all people who had to use the only road to the San Rafael Ferry? I thought it was given to the University of California as their sport teams are known as the Golden Bears.

This restaurant was once owned by the late father of Ron Martinez who lives in the Point. It contains signatures and comments by the following: Tennessee Williams, Lucy Ball, Frederic March, Casey Stengel, Bob Feller, Sandy Koufax, Alfred Hitchcock, Ed Sullivan, Herb Caen, Mary Costa, John Forsythe, Lena Horne, Barry Goldwater, Allan Sherman, Connie Haines, Joan Baez, David Byers, Helen Hayes, Ernest Borgnine, Rosemary Cloony, Jim Nabors, Pierre Salenger, Edie Adams, Dick Martil, Jimmy Dean Ben Gazarra, Richard Widmark, John Joseph Cardinal Carberry, King Hussein and Allan P. Smith. These are just a few of the autographs contained in this album. Any one interested in seeing this collection is invited to give me a call.

The autograph album is for sale and I am having it appraised by Butterfield and Butterfield. The last time I visited this organization was with Ross Dixon, popular Richmonder and former owner of the Schmidt-Dixon Funeral Home in Richmond. We brought in to be appraised, five oil paintings with ornate frames painted by a well known marine artist. The paintings were the property of Spiro Cakos, Point native and frequent contributor to the Point Richmond History Association. He inherited them from his late brothers, Andy and Captain Pete Cakos. Spiro gave them to Ross and I to give to the S/S Jeremiah O'Brien. The O'Brien is one of two remaining Liberty Ships that were built during World War Two and is still sailing. It is berthed in San Francisco.

I used to volunteer on the S/S Jeremiah O'Brien and I remember at one time someone brought in many photos of Liberty Ships built in Richmond during World War Two. I wonder whatever happened to them? Also, where are the photos of the Victory Ships built in Richmond?

You are with me if you can remember Idora Park and Neptune Beach. Idora Park was a popular family destination; it was opened in 1903 and was closed in 1928. It was located in Oakland on Telegraph Avenue between 56th and 57th Streets down to Shattuck Avenue. Idora Park contained all the features of a park which provided thrills, amusements and recreational facilities including a baseball park that was used when the 1906 earthquake ruined the original Oakland Oaks baseball park. 


