

From the President



Memories of Growing up in Point Richmond

I was born in the Memorial Hospital on 23rd Street in Richmond and raised in the Point. Our family started out on Golden Gate Avenue and ended up on Western Drive. Our father, Fred James, worked at the Standard Oil Refinery, and my Mother Gayle Janes worked for the Central Furniture Store on Macdonald Avenue.

What an outstanding place to be raised: as little kids we "Beach Combed" almost every day. Start out at Danny Keller's, go along the shore, around Washington Point, under the Standard Oil pier, around the Quarry, along through Winehaven, around the piers at the point ashore from the lighthouse, and around the corner to the Yacht Club and boat harbor at Point San Pablo where we could buy a candy bar. As we grew older, we got a rowboat and would start out at Kellers again and go out alongside the railroad tracks and under the Santa Fe Pier and go south inside the rock wall to Brooks Island. There we

would walk around, and you never knew what you might find. We always were looking for wooden bait boxes as we got ten cents for each one of them down at the bait and tackle store at the inner harbor on Cutting Boulevard. From there we went to Ardell's across the street from the Nat to buy a Tootsie Roll for a penny.

The boys we played with were Bobby Paasch, Steven Banks, Scotty Perauls and now and then Royce Ong. Royce's mom would not let him leave the house without pinning a big chunk of Jade to his long johns. Once we rowed across the bay to China Camp and were treated to some cooked shrimp. We rowed to Red Rock quite a bit because it always had some good salvage.

When we were beachcombing, we were always looking for any 2 x 12's, 3 x 12's and small piling and we would tow them back to Kellers as Danny would buy them from us. He had a marine way and would scratch and paint the

bottom of boats. He also had a beer joint on the dock and sold a lot of beer.

We had an adventure around the age of 12 when Scotty got a call from a doctor who asked him and I to go down to the inner harbor and take the tarps off a 65-foot motor sailer and wipe things Soon, the doctor would arrive with his wife and two other couples. He motored the yacht out of the slip and then let Scott or I sail it to Tiburon where he docked it. They would go to a funky place with green tar paper and have lunch and drinks and he would give us each a dollar, and after we got things cleaned up; we would head for the grocery store. On the group's return, the doctor would get the boat out of the slip and let Scotty or I sail it back to the Inner Harbor, and the doctor would take it back into the slip. He would give us each ten dollars (which was a lot of money in those days) and his group would leave the boat. A couple of times we went to Petaluma and Half Moon Bay. After they left, we would wipe

everything down, put the tarps on, and lock everything up.

As we got older, it was girls and fast cars. After the old grammar school in the Point, it was Harry Ells, then Richmond High. I went up to Downieville, worked for a while then got a call from my folks that there was a Draft Notice in the mail box. I told them to leave it there, then went to Oakland and joined the Navy. My two older brothers were in the Navy.

After my four-year hitch, I came back to the Point, got married and went to work for the Standard Oil Refinery. Then I moved to San Francisco, Los Angeles, Inglewood, and then Bakersfield. I sold our family home on Western Drive to our son David so our family continued the Point Richmond "Lifestyle".

At this point I wish to close our membership in your outstanding THIS POINT.....in time newsletter. Thank you all for keeping your newsletter going.







NICK'S TAVERN

Surviving Standard Avenue Eminent Domain

Nick Brailo was a Yugoslavian immigrant who took up residency on and eventually established a longtime business on Standard Avenue. His establishment among the very few businesses that rolled with the punches of eminent domain to remain on Standard Avenue. Nickola "Nick" Antone Brailo was born 9/15/1889 in Dalmatia, Croatia. Draft and employment records list his date of birth as 3/15/1889, while his grave marker, Social Security and California death indexes list 9/15/89. He immigrated in 1905 when what would later become Yugoslavia was part of the Astro-Hungarian Empire. Therefore, the homeland of Slavic immigrants was recorded as "Austria" on most early U.S. immigration and Census records.

An influx of Yugoslavian immigrants settled

in Richmond during the early 1900's. The East Richmond Richmond and East Heights neighborhoods in proximity to San Pablo and McBryde Avenues were where most settled. Some also settled both in North Richmond and Point Richmond as well. Upon immigration adding an "h" to surnames ending in "ic", was commonplace for phonetic pronunciation reasons. For example, "Marinovic" became "Marinovich". When my paternal great-grandparents immigrated from Yugoslavia to Chicago in 1904, my surname Cesarek became Cheshareck, as if it weren't already difficult enough to pronounce! Slavs, like most other immigrant blocs in America encountered nativism. They were referred to as "bohunks", a pejorative derived from Bohemian-Hungarian. Though the term was derogatory then,

> it is mostly a term of endearment for Slavs who use it amongst themselves today.

> Nick Brailo settled in Sacramento and found work at the Southern Pacific railroad before moving to Point Richmond around 1916. He started working for the Atchison and Topeka & Santa Fe railroad's Richmond facility and took up residency in the Colombo Hotel (See TPIT Vol. XL No. 1 for the Colombo Hotel history). Around the same time, Charles Senjo (1886-1951), another Yugoslavian, returned to Point Richmond to manage the Hotel D'Italia owned by the Pacini family, who had moved to central Contra Costa County. (See TPIT Vol. XL No. 2 for the Hotel D'Italia history). By 1917, Brailo resided in the Hotel D'Italia and assisted Senjo with managing the bar and restaurant while concurrently employed at Santa Fe.

> During Senjo's tenure, the D'Italia housed more Yugoslavian boarders

than it did Italian. In 1920, there were 19 boarders along with Senjo residing there. In 1922, Senjo left Point Richmond to manage restaurants and hotels in Oakland, and the Pacini family decided to raze the building. While one door closed for Nick Brailo, another one opened. The old Scandia Hotel and Saloon at 144-146 Standard Avenue, owned by Gustav Ericson, had sat vacant and Brailo decided to purchase the building. It was on the north side of the street between Railroad and Santa Fe Avenues. He took a gamble and left the Santa Fe railroad to go into business for himself.

While working at the Hotel D'Italia he wore many hats including cook and soda jerk, and had the experience needed to succeed in his endeavor. His new establishment initially named the Hotel D'Italia Annex, was soon known as Nick's Place. It provided lodging, a restaurant, soda fountain, and billiards. Due to the Volstead Act (Prohibition) being enacted in 1920, he had to wait until December 1933 before opening the Prohibition was the most likely factor for the Pacini's and the Ericson's getting out of the business. Although I didn't find anything in my research implicating Brailo, the hotels and bars on Standard Avenue had notoriety for flaunting the Volstead Act.


Several businessmen on Standard Avenue were arrested during prohibition including the Colombo Hotel's Ben Brignone (1874-1932) and Ralph Santini (1867-1941) along with Joe Matteucci (1887-1962), owner of the New Roma Hotel and Tavern at 125 Standard Avenue, and one of Point Richmond's wealthiest men. They were charged with either bootlegging and/or serving alcohol out of now illegal bars. Volstead disobedience wasn't exclusive to the Italian's bootlegging on Standard Avenue.

Peter "Crazy Pete" Boljat (1883-1956), a Yugoslavian native, owned a restaurant and cigar store at 219 Standard Avenue whilst operating a taxi service. He also had notoriety in Point Richmond for both alcohol related and other legal woes. His 1931 arrest for speeding in El Cerrito being the least of his troubles, he was arrested in 1933 for selling bootlegged rum, and a fine of \$300 was imposed. His incompetent lawyer failed to appear in court in S.F. and Boljat nearly ended up being taken into federal custody. This incident did not dissuade his illicit distillery as his products were in constant demand in Point Richmond.

Somehow Boliat was granted a liquor license after the rum incident and opened a legitimate saloon in the building. On April 5, 1934, he was hospitalized with first and second degree burns as well as cuts and bruises when he was blown out of a window in the cellar of the business. Boljat had attempted sticking an electric needle into a 50gallon barrel of illicit whiskey to artificially age it. An additional 50 gallons of whiskey and more than 1,000 gallons of illegal wine were also found. When his liquor license was revoked, 151 Point residents petitioned the City Council to grant him a license on June 11, 1935, but the Council had no such authority. Boljat continued bootlegging but ultimately received a 1 ½ year stint in San Quentin prison between 1939-1940. Upon parole he returned to Richmond and lived in an apartment at 565 Standard Avenue. Many Yugoslavians in Richmond also bootlegged slivovitz, a brandy derived from plums.

Upon repeal of prohibition Nick Brailo opened a bar in his establishment, but unsettling events were less than two decades away. The California Division of Highways prepared for the soon to be built Richmond-San Rafael bridge and Brailo's building was one of many directly in the pathway of Standard Avenues realignment for the bridge approach. Brailo's 3,125 square foot property was parcel number 8673 on Osborns addition, which would be completely obliterated for the new highway. In 1950 the California Division of Highways settled with Nick Brailo and later tore the building down. I could not find the amount paid in the DOH right of way files but based on comparisons of other settlements, he most likely received 35 cents per square feet plus the value of the building. He'd have been lucky to have been compensated more than \$3,000.

Unbowed, eminent domain didn't force him

off Standard Avenue. Brailo used his settlement towards the construction of a new building across the street on the southwest corner of Standard and Santa Fe Avenues in 1951. The south side of Standard Avenue was unaffected by eminent domain and the vacant lot was most likely purchased from Leonardo "Leo" Candelo (1886-1965) a wealthy Piemontese native entrepreneur on Standard Avenue. Nick's Tavern now had the address of 201 Standard Avenue, and his residential flat above the business was addressed 10 Santa Fe Avenue.

While the California Division of Highways failed to run him off Standard Avenue, the map did. Even though the building was on the old alignment of Standard Avenue, some entity decided to absorb this original alignment into Tewksbury Avenue around late 1953, thus his address became 201 Tewksbury. Nick Brailo

died on 2/11/1968 at age 78. The building now houses Aky's Café and last sold for \$1,350,000 in 2016. I hope to write about many more Standard Avenue success stories. Al Frosini, Leo Candelo, and Joe Matteucci will be included. Matteucci and Candelo were Italian immigrants, and Frosini was first generation Italian American. Another article will examine the original buildings still standing on the original Standard Avenue alignment between Railroad Avenue and the Tewksbury Avenue junction. These 6 structures were built between 1908-1952. The seventh building on the route is an apartment building constructed in 1979 well after the fact. There have been early discussions of painting a mural of the lost neighborhood on one of the I-580 freeways retaining walls. We should also explore adding Standard Avenue signage because 6 of these 7 buildings had original Standard Avenue addresses.



Joe Vogel on our Theater Treasure The Point Theater



Joe Vogel on November 5, 2014 at 11:30 am
The Point Theatre was one of several houses
in the bay area opened or re-opened by Robert
Lippert during the early days of World War II. A
letter from Lippert published in the September 12,
1942, issue of Motion Picture Herald had this
paragraph about the Point:

"June 12th, I commenced remodeling of the old Point theatre at Richmond and installed a balcony to seat 100 and renovated the house from front to back. Total seats, 450. Opened this theatre August 15th."

I haven't been able to trace the theater prior to that, but the building looks quite old and could date from the 1910s. It's possible that it operated under a different name earlier in its history. Richmond had a house called the Regent Theatre which was mentioned in the September 16, 1916, issue of The Moving Picture World. The Point building looks old enough to have been a theater in 1916. Perhaps someone can pin down a connection, as I'm coming up blank on this one.

Joe Vogel on November 5, 2014 at 1:09 pm Well, I don't know how I missed John Rice's page about the Point Theatre, which has the answers (and several good photos.) The Point Theatre was opened by Richard Tcherassy on February 14, 1913, and the building was designed by architect C. O. Clausen.


Robert Lippert renamed the house the V Theatre (for Victory,) and re-opened on August 4th, 1942. The remodeling for Lippert was designed by architect Vincent Raney. Post-war, the name Point Theatre was restored. The house opened and closed a few times after that, finally re-opening in the mid-1950s as the Ciné Theatre, a second-run, revival, and art house.

A thing I find remarkable is that the building's Greek Revival pediment has survived all this time, little worse for wear. Plaster is unlikely to have held up so well, and there are no joints as one would expect in terra cotta, so it must be either wood (frequently used for exterior trim in the Bay Area even after more than half of San Francisco went up in flames in 1906) or cast iron.

A 1924 Exhibitors Trade Review item spelled Mr. Tcherassy's name Tcherrasy, but it was mistaken. Internet search returns numerous hits referring to members of the Tcherassy family in northern California.
